## LOOK FOR PLACES WHERE HABITAT Features meet and mix

Pheasant hunting can be challenging. That's half the fun of the hunt. If you're afraid of walking - a lot - you probably shouldn't be a pheasant hunter. That said, there are ways to cut back your search time per-bird-found. The secret is understanding pheasant habitat and recognizing the types of places birds like to be.

Pheasants thrive best where there is a mix of land uses. All crops are no good because there are no yearround hiding places. All grass might hold a few birds, but land with grainfields for food will hold more. Wetlands (think cattails or willows) provide essential winter cover. Brushy thickets and tangles give birds places to hide from predators, including human hunters. Mix it all together - a mosaic- and you have prime pheasant habitat.

Within that pheasant habitat, the places where components meet and mingle will hold the most birds. Pheasants thrive best when their food is close to their bedroom – is close to their daytime hiding spots and valued escape cover.

So look for seams, edges and transition zones where cover types mix and blend together or butt up to each other. Concentrate your efforts on these kind of zones to start. You can spread out from there, but it helps to have this focus to begin the hunt.

**RESPECT PHEASANTS AND HUNT WITH STEALTH**

It's easy to think of pheasant hunting as a social occasion where you can talk a lot, laugh some and just have a good time in the field. Having a good time is important. But you'll have an even better time if you shoot a few birds. That's why being quiet, smart and a little sneaky about your hunting approach is so important.

Pheasants are as wary as wild turkeys and white-tailed deer. Give roosters the same respect you would bigger game, or your gamebag will stay empty. Surprise the birds. This means:

- Don't slam vehicle doors or tailgates
- Speak only in whispers as you get ready
- Use whispers and hand signals to communicate to hunting partners as you work cover
- Train your dog to be under control with just a little whistle toot or "hup" so you don't have to yell
- Walk slowly and quietly, with your shotgun always ready
- Zig-zag, backtrack and do little loops as you move, to keep the birds guessing
- Give your dog plenty of time to work the cover
- Go back through good-looking spots again

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# **PHEASANT CACCIATORE**

Prep Time	Cook Time	Servings
20 mins	2 hrs	4 people

### Ingredients

- 2 young pheasants, cut into serving pieces
- 1/4 pound pancetta or 4 strips bacon
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 chopped celery stalk
- 1 chopped carrot
- 1 onion, sliced into half moons
- 1 quart crushed tomatoes
- 2 cups white wine
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh sage
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh rosemary
- 1 teaspoon crushed juniper berries (optional)
- 4 bay leaves
- 1/2 ounce dried mushrooms (about a handful)
- 1/2 pound fresh mushrooms, any kind
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 4 tablespoons minced parsley

I do a lot of comfort food with big, flavorful, stew-y things loaded with tomatoes and herbs and some sort of meat. In this case the meat is pheasant, and what better dish than pheasant cacciatore?

Hunter's style. The French call it chasseur, the Spanish cazadores, the Italians cacciatore. This dish in its variations exists in all 3 countries and requires these things:

- A white meat, such as chicken, pheasant or rabbit
- White wine
- Tomatoes
- Mushrooms
- "Woodsy" herbs such as sage and rosemary

Could you use chicken here? You bet! What sort of mushrooms? A variety. What sort of wine? A dry white: think Pinot Grigio. Herbs? Definately sage and rosemary, but you could play with thyme, oregano and parsley, too.

This dish is so satisfying, the way only the combination of tomatoes, wine, mushrooms and meat can be. Buon appetito!

### Instructions

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
  - 1. Cut the pancetta into little batons about 1/4 inch thick. In a large braising pan or dutch oven, heat 2 tbsp olive oil over medium heat and cook the pancetta or bacon. Remove and reserve.
  - 2.Add the pheasant pieces and brown them well. Take your time and do it in batches. Remove the pheasant pieces as they brown.
  - 3.Add the carrot, celery, onions and fresh mushrooms and turn the heat up to high. Saute them until the onions are wilted and beginning to brown. Add more oil if needed. When they begin to brown, add the garlic and cook for another 1-2 minutes, stirring occasionally.
  - 4. Add the herbs and the dried mushrooms and the white wine and turn up the heat to maximum. Stir well. Let the wine cook down by half. Add the tomatoes and mix well. Add some salt if needed. Add the bacon and pheasant pieces, skin side up. Do not submerge the pheasant, just nestle the pieces into the sauce so the skin stays out of the liquid.
  - 5. Cover and cook in the oven for 45-60 minutes. Check to see that meat is tender, remove the cover from the pot and cook until the skin crisps, about 30-45 more minutes.
  - 6. Move the pheasant pieces to the plate. Add the parsley to the pot and mix to combine.
